Community Narcan Training—TODAY following the service, Calvary will be hosting a free Narcan training run by the harm-reduction community organization HIPS. Narcan (a.k.a. naloxone) is an effective and life-saving measure that can be quickly administered via nasal spray to someone experiencing an opioid overdose. Narcan requires no prescription in DC, Maryland, and Virginia. It may be picked up at any pharmacy, and "Good Samaritan" laws protect anybody who administers Narcan in good faith from liability. This training will help you learn the signs of an opioid overdose; prepare you to administer Narcan via nasal spray; and provide the answers to all of your questions about overdose assistance. DC experienced a record-high 567 fatal overdoses in 2021; the vast majority of these loved ones were Black and brown. Narcan has become an important tool of compassionate community response to the overdose epidemic and the fatal war on drugs. This training is for everyone -- yes, even you! 
