

"i did not know i could be beautiful (number 5)" by Ashon Crawley

"the way to gesture praise, worship, the way to announce openness and vulnerability, the way to raise hands and produce a prayerful posture varies. there are various ways to say yes, to surrender, to bloom. and what if this variousness is the occasion to think relation, the difference a point of convergence for our living with one another in ways that pursue a more just,

equitable, kind, tender, thoughtful, loving world? young ashon, who was so doctrinaire and legalistic and thought there was only one path of righteousness, could not imagine bean pie and Iftars during Ramadan with friends that are family and laughter and love with difference had so much to learn, is still learning so much.

when encountering the original image, i was struck and moved by its simplicity. i felt color and verve and something familiar in it, her gentle head and hands, a lightness and love. and i desired, in general, to expand the series beyond blackpentecostalism but within blackness. there is so much room in blackness, so much variousness, so much difference. something to celebrate.

the foundation of this piece is another 'dancing in one spot' painting (the last image), it's used as a silhouette for the figure's face, hands, sleeve and part of the khimar. a coming together of traditions, gesture and posture as relation, rooted in blackness. this is the practice, the prayer, of black social life."

Ashon T. Crawley is an American scholar of religion and author. He is Associate Professor of Religious Studies and African American and African Studies at the University of Virginia and author of *Blackpentecostal Breath: The Aesthetics of Possibility* on aesthetics and performance as modes of social imagination, and *The Lonely Letters*, an epistolary, semi-autobiographical work on love, blackness, mysticism, and quantum theory.

Rev. Dr. Shaundra Cunningham serves as associate dean for community life at Rockefeller Memorial Chapel at the University of Chicago. She relocated often as a military kid while remaining steeped in her family's front porch sensibilities by way of Columbia, South Carolina. An ordained Baptist minister, Shaundra received her MDiv from Harvard Divinity School and recently completed her PhD in cultural geography from the University of Tennessee.

Celebrating 15 years in ministry, Shaundra has a decade of clinical experience, including as hospital chaplain for all the medical intensive care units at both the Cleveland Clinic and Swedish Hospital in Seattle. She also serves as chaplain to a global network of social entrepreneurs through Echoing Green and the J.M. Kaplan Fund Social Innovation Prize. Embracing the festivity and joy of religiosity, one of Shaundra's favorite quotes comes from Nietzsche: "I would believe only in a god who could dance." Similar to her mother and grandmothers, Shaundra's favorite color is yellow and guides her approach to life and ministry.



- We believe LGBTQ+ lives are sacred, beautiful, and ought to be fully included and affirmed in all aspects of congregational life and leadership.
- We celebrate that our worshipping life is multi-lingual and multi-dimensional, especially shaped by Latin American, particularly Salvadoran, traditions, and the Historic Black Church tradition.
- We value interfaith inclusion and welcome people of any and all faith traditions to find a home here.
- We value people for who they are and not for their role in an economy where wealth accumulates and people struggle to live.
