



**Lectura | Scripture****Juan | John 9:1-41***Josh Russell, Liturgist*

Al pasar Jesús, vio a un hombre ciego de nacimiento.<sup>2</sup> Y le preguntaron sus discípulos, diciendo: Rabí, ¿quién pecó, este o sus padres, para que haya nacido ciego? <sup>3</sup> Respondió Jesús: No es que pecó este, ni sus padres, sino para que las obras de Dios se manifiesten en él.<sup>4</sup> Me es necesario hacer las obras del que me envió, entre tanto que el día dura; la noche viene, cuando nadie puede trabajar.<sup>5</sup> Entre tanto que estoy en el mundo, luz soy del mundo.<sup>6</sup> Dicho esto, escupió en tierra, e hizo lodo con la saliva, y untó con el lodo los ojos del ciego,<sup>7</sup> y le dijo: Ve a lavarte en el estanque de Siloé (que traducido es, Enviado). Fue entonces, y se lavó, y regresó viendo.<sup>8</sup> Entonces los vecinos, y los que antes le habían visto que era ciego, decían: ¿No es este el que se sentaba y mendigaba?<sup>9</sup> Unos decían: Él es; y otros: A él se parece. Él decía: Yo soy.<sup>10</sup> Y le dijeron: ¿Cómo te fueron abiertos los ojos?<sup>11</sup> Respondió él y dijo: Aquel hombre que se llama Jesús hizo lodo, me untó los ojos, y me dijo: Ve al Siloé, y lávate; y fui, y me lavé, y recibí la vista.<sup>12</sup> Entonces le dijeron: ¿Dónde

está él? Él dijo: No sé. <sup>13</sup>Llevaron ante los fariseos al que había sido ciego. <sup>14</sup>Y era día de reposo cuando Jesús había hecho el lodo, y le había abierto los ojos. <sup>15</sup>Volvieron, pues, a preguntarle también los fariseos cómo había recibido la vista. Él les dijo: Me puso lodo sobre los ojos, y me lavé, y veo. <sup>16</sup>Entonces algunos de los fariseos decían: Ese hombre no procede de Dios, porque no guarda el día de reposo. Otros decían: ¿Cómo puede un hombre pecador hacer estas señales? Y había disensión entre ellos. <sup>17</sup>Entonces volvieron a decirle al ciego: ¿Qué dices tú del que te abrió los ojos? Y él dijo: Que es profeta.

<sup>34</sup>Respondieron y le dijeron: Tú naciste del todo en pecado, ¿y nos enseñas a nosotros? Y le expulsaron. <sup>35</sup>Oyó Jesús que le habían expulsado; y hallándole, le dijo: ¿Crees tú en el Hijo de Dios? <sup>36</sup>Respondió él y dijo: ¿Quién es, Señor, para que crea en él? <sup>37</sup>Le dijo Jesús: Pues le has visto, y el que habla contigo, él es. <sup>38</sup>Y él dijo: Creo, Señor; y le adoró. <sup>39</sup>Dijo Jesús: Para juicio he venido yo a este mundo; para que los que no ven, vean, y los que ven, sean cegados. <sup>40</sup>Entonces algunos de los fariseos que estaban con él, al oír esto, le dijeron: ¿Acaso nosotros somos también ciegos? <sup>41</sup>Jesús les respondió: Si fuerais ciegos, no tendríais pecado; mas ahora, porque decís: Vemos, vuestro pecado permanece.

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As Jesus walked along, he saw a man who was blind from birth. <sup>2</sup>Jesus' disciples asked, "Rabbi, who sinned so that he was born blind, this man or his parents?" <sup>3</sup>Jesus answered, "Neither he nor his parents. This happened so that God's mighty works might be displayed in him. <sup>4</sup>While it's daytime, we must do the works of him who sent me. Night is coming when no one can work. <sup>5</sup>While I am in the world, I am the light of the world." <sup>6</sup>After he said this, he spit on the ground, made mud with the saliva, and smeared the mud on the man's eyes. <sup>7</sup>Jesus said to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (this word means sent). So the man went away and washed. When he returned, he could see. <sup>8</sup>The man's neighbors and those who used to see him when he was a beggar said, "Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?" <sup>9</sup>Some said, "It is," and others said, "No, it's someone who looks like him." But the man said, "Yes, it's me!" <sup>10</sup>So they asked him, "How are you now able to see?" <sup>11</sup>He answered, "The man they call Jesus made mud, smeared it on my eyes, and said, 'Go to the pool of Siloam and wash.' So I went and washed, and then I could see." <sup>12</sup>They asked, "Where is this man?" He replied, "I don't know." <sup>13</sup>Then they led the man who had been born blind to the Pharisees. <sup>14</sup>Now Jesus made the mud and smeared it on the man's eyes on a Sabbath day. <sup>15</sup>So Pharisees also asked him how he was able to see. The man told them, "He put mud on my eyes, I washed, and now I see." <sup>16</sup>Some Pharisees said, "This man isn't from God, because he breaks the Sabbath law." Others said, "How can a sinner do miraculous signs like these?" So they were divided. <sup>17</sup>Some of the Pharisees questioned the man who had been born blind again: "What do you have to say about him, since he healed your eyes?" He replied, "He's a prophet."

<sup>34</sup>They responded, "You were born completely in sin! How is it that you dare to teach us?" Then they expelled him. <sup>35</sup>Jesus heard they had expelled the man born blind. Finding him, Jesus said, "Do you believe in the Human One?" <sup>36</sup>He answered, "Who is he, sir? I want to believe in him." <sup>37</sup>Jesus said, "You have seen him. In fact, he is the one speaking with you." <sup>38</sup>The man said, "Lord, I believe." And he worshipped Jesus. <sup>39</sup>Jesus said, "I have come into the world to exercise judgment so that those who don't see can see and those who see will become blind." <sup>40</sup>Some Pharisees who were with him heard what he said and asked, "Surely we aren't blind, are we?" <sup>41</sup>Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you wouldn't have any sin, but now that you say, 'We see,' your sin remains.

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We are a multi-racial, multi-ethnic community of Christ followers committed to the sacred work of anti-racism, social justice, and radical inclusion.

# **OUR BELOVEDNESS | A Values Statement**

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We affirm that God celebrates the creative diversity of God's kin-dom, loving people of every color, faith, nationality, immigration status, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, physical and cognitive ability, and economic status. It matters that people who have been historically marginalized by the Christian church in America see themselves listed here as God's beloved. In other words, ***you*** are our values statement.

- We believe Black Lives Matter. Further still, Black Lives are precious and beloved by God. We are a church shaped by this profound theological statement. Until this is fully understood and expressed in the policies and practices of this nation's political and social life, it is essential for people of faith to keep saying, and living, this truth.
- We believe no human being is "illegal," and as a Sanctuary Church, we fully welcome and support people of all immigration statuses.
- We believe LGBTQ+ lives are sacred, beautiful, and ought to be fully included and affirmed in all aspects of congregational life and leadership.
- We celebrate that our worshipping life is multi-lingual and multi-dimensional, especially shaped by Latin American, particularly Salvadoran, traditions, and the Historic Black Church tradition.
- We value interfaith inclusion and welcome people of any and all faith traditions to find a home here.
- We value people for who they are and not for their role in an economy where wealth accumulates and people struggle to live.

# **OUR HOLY IMAGINATION | A Vision Statement**


