Recycling Is Important

In the U.S., the average family of four throws out 2,907 kilograms (6,404 pounds) of paper, glass, plastic, food scraps and other trash every year. That's about as much as 115 third graders weigh! Those pounds of trash add up. It can pollute the planet and hurt wildlife. Trash is made up of solids, liquids, and gases take the shape of their containers. All these kinds of matter take up space. There will be less homes and less cities. People can recycle trash by reusing the trash. Recycling is important because if you put trash in the sea, sea animals will die and homeless dogs might die because of trash.

Glass, plastic and metal can all be recycled. But how are each of these materials recycled?

Glass containers that are recycled first have to be sorted by color. Then they are crushed and melted in a furnace. The hot glass pours out of the furnace and then blown in to molds. After it cools and solidifies, it is taken out and cut to form a bottle or a jar.

Plastic last for hundreds of years without decomposing. This is why it is essential to recycle it. Plastic is recycled kind of like glass and can be made into many things. Carpet fiber, polyester clothing, and other plastic containers can all be made out of recycled plastic. Plastic is pretty difficult to recycle because there are many different types of plastic. Some melt at different temperatures, and the different materials that they are made of have different properties and characteristics.

Metal can also be recycled. It is brought to a recycling plant and then it is shredded. Next, the coatings on the metal are removed. After that, a furnace melts it into liquid. It takes less energy to melt an old can than melting new metal. It is made into bars and crushed flat into new sheets of metal for cars.

What is your favorite food? My favorite food is pizza.



Question: Can we tell if air weighs anything?

<u>Hypothesis</u>: If we fill a balloon with air and compare it to an empty balloon, then we will not see a difference in the weight between the two balloons.

<u>Result</u>: We were actually able to tell that a balloon filled with air weighed more than an empty balloon.

Step 1: (optional) Read the book

Step 2: Get a clothes hanger and tape one balloon to it.

Step 3: Then blow up the other balloon and leave the taped one empty. (Ask an older kid to help you if you need help blowing up the balloon)

Step 4: Once you have taped both balloons to either side of the hanger, balance the hanger on a pencil and observe which direction the hanger tilts.
